International Destinations

n addition to receiving excellent offers for universities in the United Kingdom, Harrodian Upper Sixth students have also enjoyed considerable success this year further afield in Australia, Hong Kong and the United States. Mr Behan, Head of Sixth Form, successfully introduced and organised SAT preparation classes in-house at the Harrodian and, as a result, there are a number of students with offers to study in the United States next year. Two such students are Jake Denton (U6B) and Sofia Donavan- Lafuente (U6WA), left. It is a big move for Jake, who has been a student at the Harrodian since Reception and was born and bred in Barnes. Determined to study the best course for Film and Business Administration, regardless of distance, he has succeeded in gaining a place at the University of Southern California (USC). The decision was even easier for Sofia, who is not only half-American, but is also the third generation in her family to study at Middlebury College in Vermont, the most sought-after college for her chosen subject - Liberal Arts. Both completed their A Levels but also sat the SATs, a five-hour examination in Mathematics, Critical Reading and Writing, in order to gain unconditional University offers.

ACADEMIC MILESTONES

Graduation Day marked significant academic milestones and achievements in the Prep School. Our 10s celebrated their

graduation into the 11s, a larger year group with 30 new pupils, whilst also preparing to face the rigours of 13+ Common Entrance. The 12s were congratulated on becoming Senior School pupils. They achieved an overall average of 67% in their Common Entrance, the highest figure yet, and were presented with their examination certificates. Two guest speakers - Arthur Sturridge, below, for the 10s and Matt Frei (news journalist and TV presenter) for the 12s - made introductory speeches and presented subject winners and overall achievers with their prizes. It was the perfect occasion to honour our Harrodian Prep pupils.

CAMBRIDGE FIRST

The Harrodian is very proud of Arthur Sturridge, *below*, Head Boy in 2009-2010, who has just graduated from Cambridge University with a First in Philosophy from St John's College. Arthur will remain at Cambridge to begin his MSc in the Philosophy of Science.

Many of them were pushed to their own personal limits, whilst also looking out for their friends and, in the process, encompassed what it means to be a true Harrodian.

A RIVER RUNS THROUGH IT

This term 70 adventurous pupils from the 13s and accompanying staff spent a week in the Ardèche region of France. Highlights of the trip included canoeing 32 kilometres down the Ardèche river, *above*, crawling

in and out of tiny caves, climbing up rock faces, swinging through a high ropes course and sleeping out under the stars. Pupils also benefited from practising their spoken French. The trip was enjoyable but challenging, a lesson in overcoming fears and endurance.

ENCOURAGING ENTERPRISE

he 13s' Enterprise Fair was their most successful to date, raising over £600 for *Indian Ocean Disaster Relief*. Pupils were given £5 each to buy their stock and an 'Apprentice'-style struggle ensued as the teams battled to generate the highest profit. Some sold produce such as smoothies, *above*, popcorn and cakes, whilst others organised priced activities such as golf, football and a popular water bomb throwing contest. Enterprise skills learnt by the 13s in the classroom came to life in this practical and energetic application of business in the real world.

AT ONE WITH NATURE

Both PP1 classes enjoyed a trip to Kew Gardens to learn more about flora. They participated in a workshop led by a Kew Gardens teacher and then, divided into smaller groups, had the opportunity to explore the Palm House, the Waterlily House and the Princess of Wales Conservatory. There they discovered a selection of exotic plants, fruit trees and tropical fish. One of their favourite discoveries was a large tree that took fifteen of them holding hands to make a circle around its trunk, *below*.

IN THE FIELD

During the Easter holidays a group of 14s Geographers and Chemists headed off to Iceland for a five-day trip, *right*. Each day was packed full of exciting activities, including swimming in the Blue Lagoon, hiking on Sólheimajökull, watching the hot water plumes erupt at Geyser, getting soaking wet at Seljalandsfoss waterfall and enjoying the breath-taking scenery of Gullfoss and Thingvellir National Park. They also visited a power station and tomato farm that harness the geothermal energy that Iceland is famous for.

UNDER THE MICROSCOPE

The School's annual Spring Term Science Week involved pupils from Reception through to the 14s. All had the opportunity to take part in a wide variety of experiments and workshops.

Pupils enjoyed taking part in an interactive presentation by the Science Boffins and in classroom workshops where they used balloons and tins to experiment with static electricity, *above*.

an engaging performance to the 8s about forces and friction. The 9s attended a workshop about sound, different pitches of vibration and the effect they have on our bodies. The 10s participated in a Spaghetti Challenge, *above*. Using only spaghetti and marshmallows they had to build a construction that would support a Kinder Egg.

Upper Prep & Seniors

Pupils in the 11s spent a month designing and conducting experiments and then had the opportunity to present their projects in the School Theatre as part of the annual Science Fair. This year's overall winners were Charles Drayson (11SU) with his 'Reaction Test', which examined the speed of our reactions and the effect our age has on them, and Gus Crewdson (11B), who investigated different wing designs and their effect on the lift of an airplane. Sultan Al Rahbani (11C), right, also won a prize for the best presentation with his experiment about the structures of bridges. In Physics the 12s concentrated on engineering and bridge construction, while the 13s used their ingenuity to design paper roller coasters. Meanwhile the 14s were Crime Scene Investigators involved in analysing evidence and tracking down the murderer of Mrs Allen (Science).

In addition to these activities, all the year groups enjoyed an amazing presentation of birds of prey, with some species even being released to soar and swoop over the audience!



CHALLENGING ARITHMETIC

It has been a busy year for Harrodian Mathematicians as they participated in the UK Mathematics Trust Intermediate and Senior Challenges, as well as the Hans Woyda Inter-School Competition. To prepare, pupils attend a weekly Maths Challenge Club in order to study past Olivia Dravson (U6DO) questions. scored in the top 25% of all Senior School candidates in the UK and received a merit certificate. There were also other strong performances in the intermediate from age category Chris Wheeler (13MY), Damian Elle (13H), Francesco Paschetto (15P) and Jonas Sinjan (15D). There are few places in the world as blissful as Rome on a perfect spring day. The Colosseum, the Spanish Steps, the Pantheon, sunglasses and ice-cream...what more could a Harrodian want? The 11s visited the Holy City's most awe-inspiring sites. They also walked the cobbled streets of Pompeii, frozen in time, climbed Mount Vesuvius and went to Pozzuoli to see the dormant Solfatara, a volcano once believed to be the gateway to hell. Some of our pupils enlightened their peers with well-researched presentations on many of the sites; others delighted them with impromptu concerts on a variety of stages, from the Trevi Fountain to Pompeii's



2000-year-old theatre. Mr Rossetti looked a little anxious at times, but no one was sure whether it was because the volcano in Naples was about to erupt or because his wife in London was about to give birth...

AN ANCIENT CAPITAL

In preparation for their trip over the May Bank Holiday, the 13s Classicists attended two talks about the history of Istanbul: one by our very own historian, Mr Murray (Head of Photography and Graphic Design), and the other by novelist/historian, Jason Goodwin. On arriving in the ancient city, Mr Hooke set the tone for three days of intense activity by leading the group on its first sightseeing trip, immediately upon arrival, at 1.00am! They experienced Istanbul by night, when most of the city still seemed to be dancing and singing in the streets. Over the next few days, they visited some magnificent buildings: the Blue Mosque, Hagia Sophia, the Basilica Cistern and Topkapi Palace. 



Sophie Hallam (L6H), below, has painted one tree across three divided canvases.




