Each class also attended a workshop about sharks, where they learned many interesting facts and were even able to examine and hold a shark tooth!




Celebrating Antiquity

BUDDING ARTISTS

Pre-Prep enjoyed a week dedicated to art. Professional artists led workshops with each of the forms, assisting them in creating their own class sculpture. Each year group had a different topic to focus on: 'Under The Sea' for Reception, 'Pirates' for PP1, 'Animals' for PP2 and 'Clothes and Textiles' for PP3. Pupils enjoyed learning new artistic techniques and proudly displayed their artwork for parents and staff to view.

Inspired by *Tree Cozy*, a work by fibre artist Carol Hummel, 12s students learned basic crochet stitches before 'yarn-bombing' several trees in candy colours around the school! The front cover features a photo of one of these decorated trees.

LICHTENSTEIN Retrospective

A group of 11s enjoyed a bespoke tour and private view of *Lichtenstein, the Retrospective* at Tate Modern; an explosive and dynamic exhibition. Pupils were able to view 150 works by a founding father of Pop Art. One of the rooms was dedicated to Lichtenstein's work in black and white - a theme that the 11s have been developing in their own art. After their visit, pupils participated in a printmaking and collage workshop, where they were able to create their own artwork in response to selected paintings and sculptures from the Gallery.





SURVIVAL OF THE

MOVING Mountains

The 12s enjoyed a post Common Entrance four-day Mountaincraft trip to Wales. The trip presented the group with many challenges, the biggest of which was to climb Snowdon, the highest mountain in Wales. Other activities included rock climbing, abseiling, kayaking, weaseling, walking, fire lighting wilderness cookery and navigation. Pupils learnt how to operate safely in a mountain environment, to recognize and reduce risk and to prepare and plan an expedition. They met each trial with confidence, enthusiasm, developed



their sense of responsibility alongside testing their resilience and resourcefulness.

THE GREAT OUTDOORS

In June, Mr Jordan organised an exciting Bushcraft trip for his 10s. Pupils had the opportunity to experience two days of life in the great outdoors without electricity or any modern-day luxuries. They took part in a range of activities: sleeping in tents, building shelters, fishing, orienteering, fire making and fire safety, scavenging, animal tracking, camouflage and concealment, to name a few. The group learnt key survival skills and appreciated teamwork and camaraderie.

ARDÈCHE

In June, 69 adventurous pupils from the 13s and accompanying staff travelled to the Ardèche region of France. Highlights of the trip included canoeing 32 kilometres down the Ardèche river, crawling through rocks, climbing a rock face, swinging through a high ropes course and sleeping out under the stars. Pupils also benefitted from practising their spoken French. The trip was enjoyable but challenging, a lesson in overcoming fears and endurance.

FITTEST.

THE

SCIENCE FAIR

Our 11s pupils worked hard on their Science projects this year and spent a month designing and conducting experiments. Winning projects from each form were exhibited at the school's fourth annual Science Fair. The overall winner was Ariana Eisler (11F) with her presentation on 'How the volume of water in a glass affects the pitch of the sound.'

FALCONRY

Martin from *Xtreme Falconry* returned again this year with another amazing presentation of birds of prey. Students in the 11s and 14s were treated to a display of iconic species from five different birds of prey groups. On show were the White Tailed Sea Eagle, Harris Hawk, Peregrine Falcon, Kestrel, European Eagle Owl, Barn Owl and a huge Golden Eagle. Some of the birds were even released to swoop over the audience!



INVENTIONS & DISCOVERIES

Science Boffins

The Prep-Prep celebrated by coming to school dressed as scientists. The company, *Science Boffins*, started the day with a show and demonstration all about states of matter. Each class also benefitted from an individual workshop with a Science Boffin, with whom they had the opportunity to conduct some interesting experiments, one of which involved making vanilla ice cream from dry ice!

Flying Lessons

The 9s and 10s this year examined how things fly. They learned about airplane wings and the importance of air resistance and lift. They were able to test their knowledge by making a range of paper airplanes, each with different wingspans and designs.

Building Bridges

In physics the 12s were given the task of building bridges that could withstand the most weight, from nothing but ice lolly sticks, string and glue! Pupils were creative with their designs in the race to build the winning bridge. In the process they learnt about forces and civil engineering.

Paper Roller Coasters

Engineers for the week, the 13s designed

looping, spiralling, twisting marble roller coasters from cardboard and sticky tape. Groups had to work together to create the support structure and coaster track. The project helped them gain a practical understanding of physics and of forces.

CSI (Crime Scene Investigators)

It was *CSI* Harrodian starring the 14s! Their mission was to sift through police reports and witness statements, analyse trace evidence for blood, compare blood samples to determine blood type, examine DNA samples, handwriting and fingerprints left by the culprit in order to determine who in the Science Department killed Ms Oldacre.

HELPING OTHERS

As part of the Youth Philanthropy Initiative (YPI), the 13s visited and researched local charities seeking to improve their communities. Working in groups, the 13s have been busy raising £3,000. They arranged fundraising events such as cake sales, mufti days and fancy dress fun runs. Each of the groups made a presentation on why their charity should be chosen. A panel of judges, consisting of business representatives, staff, the Head Girl and BBC newsreader Ben Brown, selected the winning group: Eloise Roitman, Alex Haug, George Drayson and Madeleine Gould all from 13B. They presented a cheque to their chosen charity, Small Steps, that helps children with disabilities and their families. Serena Swire (13F) also gave such an impressive presentation that she was invited to perform it at the National YPI winners' event.

PROMOTING A Healthy Lifestyle

The 10s celebrated *Fit for Life* day (left) by making healthy bruschettas and fruit smoothies, taking part in an aerobics class, picking up litter by the Leg O'Mutton Reservoir, listening to a presentation by the NHS on growing up and bodily changes and participating in a sponsored skip for the *British Heart Foundation*.

BAKING FOR BETTER

This term the 11s and 12s having been taking part in a house Harrodian Bake Off to raise money for injured paratroopers and a Sri Lankan children's charity. The competition has required them to bake cakes themed around the Harrodian houses, their colours and emblems. All baked the same recipe but with some very obvious differences in design! A panel of judges, consisting of teaching and administration staff, selected the finalists who then had to bake their cakes at school. Mount Vesuvius, lording it over the Bay of Naples, was the focus of the last few days. The group walked the evocative streets of Pompeii, that have been preserved over the centuries by the volcano's ash over and climbed to the edge of Vesuvius's crater. Apparently, an eruption is overdue....

LE RUGBY À Biarritz

In the Easter holidays, nineteen pupils from the 12s went on a rugby tour to Biarritz. They were able to experience different rugby culture and а approach to training. The under-13s participated in rugby training sessions with Biarrtiz Academy coaches and professional players: Martin Aramburu (Argentina Rugby Union) and Imanoul Harinordiquay (France International). They also played two rugby matches against French schools, one of which they lost and the other which they won.



Additional highlights included watching a match between Biarritz and Perpignan and meeting the Biarritz players. Visiting the beach and town and sampling the gastronomic delights were also part of the experience!

SKI-RACING

Sixteen members of the Harrodian School Ski Team competed with 142 British and international schools at the annual British Inter-schools Ski Challenge in Chamonix, France. The team overcame the snowy conditions to achieve our best results to date, with two excellent top-ten finishes from Maxime Seknadje (11SA), who finished 8th place in the Under 12 boys' race and Emmanuelle Hersman (8O), who achieved 8th place in the Under 12 girls' race. ATHLETICS



Huge progress has been made in athletics, due not only to the enthusiasm of the pupils but also to regular Saturday training sessions. In the recent Thomas's Clapham Athletics Competition, the Harrodian came third overall in the Lower Prep and second overall in the Senior Prep. For the first time in this competition, PP3 won in their age category. Both Alice Burdett Coutts (12B) and Amy Wright (12H) won three gold medals each in the U13 events. 62 Harrodian pupils also took part in the Newton Prep's Athletics Competition. Gold winners were: Isaac Russell (12B) in U13 Discuss, Alexandra Morley (11SA) in U13 Javelin and Nick Prynn (10R) in U11 80 meters. The main event for the U11-14s was the English Schools Athtletics Association National Competition, in which they competed admirably.

CYCLING Proficiency

The Psychology Of War

Professor Edgar Jones from King College's Centre for Military Health Research, University of London gave a presentation to the Sixth Form on the Psychology of War. Professor Jones is a preeminent authority on the psychological impact of warfare and offered Harrodian students a fascinating insight into the reaction and behaviour of both civilians and soldiers during times of extreme stress. Professor Jones considered a number of examples from the Battle of the Somme to more recent terrorist events including the psychological impact of the April Boston Marathon bombing.

STORY TIME

This term the Library held two of its most popular annual events: Dad's Reading Morning (below) and A Night in the Library. The first involved the whole Prep School coming dressed as an inspirational male. Two dads from each class, from the 8s to 11s, read contrasting stories on the theme of Cliffhanger or Comedy? which prompted some interesting discussions. A Night in the Library involved staff, Lower Sixth prefects and the 8s. They enjoyed a story, watched a movie, made a book and indulged in some role play as their favourite book characters!
